

Nature Walk

450 metre long walk that traces the path of a former sandblow which over the last 40 years has become colonised by vegetation.

32 interpretive signs describe the relationship between the plant communities and soil development.

The nature walk takes 10 to 20 minutes and is safe for children as it lies inside the Dingo fence that surrounds Eurong Village.

Volunteers from the Fraser Island Defenders Organisation (FIDO) have worked to establish a Nature Walk in the middle of Eurong to help people appreciate some of Fraser Island's outstanding natural values.

The 450 metre long walk that traces the path of a former sandblow that over the last 40 years has become colonised by vegetation and FIDO wanted to explain the process.

John Sinclair from FIDO says "Eurong is the most visited site on Fraser Island and it is appropriate to have some interpretation of the landscape and environment here where more people stop than anywhere else"

He added that the walk that takes 10 to 20 minutes was very safe for children because it was inside the dingo fence that surrounds Eurong Village.

A special feature of the walk will be showing how Melaleucas can survive being buried by 15 metres of sand and still survive as is shown by some melaleucas that were then exhumed by the wind that are many hundreds and possibly thousands years old.
